# Y6 TRANSITION IS NOT FAR

AHEAD OF YEAR 6 TRANSITION in the Summer of 2024, everyone at Egg Soup felt it might be worthwhile producing an information pack, so that by the time Primary students come to visit our school there will be an Issue produced including an article detailing the ins and outs of what will happen on the day!

As a result, I have created a breakdown of the day...

#### **School day**

School starts at 8.45am when you have form for 20 minutes which is time to develop Maths and English skills and ask your tutor any questions you have. You have five different lessons a day that last an hour with a 20-minute break in the morning and a 50-minute lunch in the afternoon. The school day finishes at 3.15pm.

#### **Enrichment**

Our school provides a variety of different subjects for a variety of different interests such as Sport, Drama, Music, Business Enterprise, STEM, Duke of Edinburgh, charity events, revision classes and many more. These clubs take place in the mornings, lunchtimes and after school and they help enhance your educational experience.

#### The Peake Building

We moved into the £7.1m state-of-the-art Peake building in April 2023. This building includes 32 classrooms and zero carbon technologies in the design. The subjects it houses are the Art, Music, Geography, Maths, Religious Studies and History Departments, as well as the main school dining room.

There is also a dedicated SEND suite. Our school has had many links to space since 1962 when it opened so this new building was named after the astronaut Tim Peake. The sport department also had an upgrade around this time with a full-size AstroTurf pitch. By the time you have joined the school the school field will be extended, and 5 full size tennis courts will be built.

#### **Curriculum**

In Key Stage 3 (Year 7, 8 and 9), you will study Mathematics, English, Science, History, Geography, Religious Education, Computing, Design and Technology, Physical Education, Art, Music and Drama. Students also study one Modern Foreign Language (either French or German).

You also get a lesson of PHSE once a week to prepare you for life after school.

We look forward to welcoming you soon.

- Logical Reasoning: Maths is all about logic and built on rules.


